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#### **Course Description:**

Course members will develop an understanding of and appreciation for evaluation research with a community-based participatory and action research orientation. Together course members will explore the history and practice of community-based participatory and action research (CBP-AR), and will be introduced to the key components of program evaluation and their application. We will finish by considering how findings are best translated to policy and practice in order to achieve change.

#### **Modality:**

Fully Online via UA Zoom platform. The course will be designed as synchronous. Each live online meeting will be recorded to allow participation by those outside the time zone and/or unavailable during the course meeting time.

#### Instructor:

<u>Dr. Beth Meyerson</u> is a Research Professor with the Southwest Institute for Research on Women (SIROW) in the College of Social and Behavioral Sciences at UofA. Dr. Meyerson has over two decades of experience with community-based research and evaluation in public health, harm reduction and sexual health. She has worked with community coalitions in the U.S., the Caribbean, Africa and India to translate findings to policy and practice. She is also a teacher and mentor to students, colleagues and community partners. Prior to joining the UA faculty in August 2019, Dr. Meyerson was an Associate Professor at the Indiana University School of Public Health-Bloomington where she was awarded a Bicentennial Professorship in recognition of her academic-community partnerships (2018) and the Trustee's Teaching Award (2015). She has over 20 years of university-based teaching experience using online and campus-

based modalities. She creates 'porous' classrooms where students can work together with community partners to apply course learning to real-world challenges to advance learning while serving communities.

#### **Course Overview**

Each week will be structured similarly, with up to five components: 1) Overview, 2) Reading and Viewing Materials, 3) Diving deeper, 4) Discussion, and 5) Talks with Course Notes (posted after the course meeting).

### Week 1 (February 2, 2021): Power, Promise and Participation

Overview: During this first week, members will have the opportunity to introduce themselves in a "meet me" video, share experiences and skill sets from their careers and community-based work, discuss core concepts of the course. Members will also hear from featured guests who have worked with Dr. Meyerson on community-based evaluations and translating findings for policy and practice.

#### Preparation Due Thursday January 28, 5pm Arizona Time (MST):

- <u>Survey</u>: Members will be asked to take a brief survey to identify their current knowledge and skills related to program evaluation and community participation in evaluation research. Survey findings will inform course emphases and will identify student leaders who can contribute their knowledge and experience to the course.
- Meet Me Video: Members are encouraged to make a brief (2-3 minute) video introducing themselves to the class. The video should include: name and domicile, career (past or present), passion (What am I most passionate about?), and communities and community partners with which they are working or have worked. Directions about making and sharing the video will be sent by Dr. Meyerson to class members in advance.

Members will consider several examples from the work of SIROW (Southwest Institute for Research on Women), an award-winning institute at the University of Arizona specializing in community-based program evaluation. Members will then have the opportunity to consider 'next steps' for those that wish to pursue additional training in community-based program evaluation.
